"SALUTE TO FRANCE"

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One would appreciate it if French ensembles with varying instrumentation of the

same type would more often present such alluring curiosities.

Who today in France plays Le Bal de Beatrice d'Este by Reynaldo Hahn, an

elegant suite of dances displaying a subtle and refined neo-classicism? Or the

Symphonic Suite "Paris" by Ibert, a curious album of colored picture postcards

(the metro, the suburbs, the Bois de Boulogne, the mosque...yes, indeed)? In a

more serious vein, the concerto for Cello by Ibert, where a sole string instrument

audaciously confronts ten wind instruments, or even Poulenc's Aubade, which is

no longer in the current repertoire. Why? This is a question that was apparently

asked in New York, and answered with a great deal of class. The interpretation is

fresh, without bombast, always finding just the right style. A remarkable piece of

work, and for us, the French, carelessly forgetful of our patrimony, certainly an

object lesson.
